## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2018

Last year saw significant developments for our club. It was an extremely busy year and it has been a pleasure to serve you as Chairman. This report is focused on the Registered Club and the Bowling Clubs will report separately.

The clubhouse renovations were successfully completed that transformed it into a modern attractive facility. The design by Sue Jago provided the plan for features in the selection of finishes, fittings and furniture. The floor to ceiling windows along the western side has brought light into the clubhouse and provides expansive views of the greens. The construction process went according to plan with only some minor delays. We continued to operate during the construction albeit sometime under trying circumstances and I thank our members for your understanding and patience. Importantly, we were able to complete the renovations within budget and were able to do more than what was originally planned.

As part of bringing a modern look and feel to the clubhouse, we rebranded the club to trade as The St Ives Club. When we opened the doors to the new clubhouse at the end November it immediately attracted large numbers. The first few days were very hectic and somewhat overwhelming. We have seen a dramatic increase in patronage both at the bar and in the restaurant with many joining as social members. There have been many days and evenings when the clubhouse has been full or close to it. ANZAC Day was a huge success with BBQ lunch, bowls, Two Up and live music with four bar staff run off their feet. The introduction of Sunday Live is very popular and a big success thanks to Iain Howell suggesting and organizing it.

The renovations increased the capacity of the restaurant to seat 88 and meals can also be served in the lounge area. After an extensive recruitment process we appointed What's Cooking as our restaurant operator. The principle Sujana Jash and his chef prepared menus for both A La Carte and Bistro service. From the opening the restaurant has been very popular and

enjoyed good patronage. There were some issues with service in the early days but this improved over time. The introduction of specials on Tuesday and Wednesday nights attracted a lot of dinners. The restaurant was successful and had some big nights. However we did have some concerns the most important being that Sujan was not present and actively involved with the restaurant operations every night. We asked him on many occasions to appoint a Maître D' but it never happened. Then in the first week of August the relationship between Sujan and his chef broken down and the chef left with no notice and took the kitchen staff with him. This left Sujan with no staff to operate the kitchen so we had to close the restaurant and terminate our arrangement. We immediately started the search for a new restaurant operator and as I write this report we have had initial discussions with two potential operators. We hope the restaurant will re-open in the near future.

The financial results for the year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018 were impacted by reduced trading while the renovations were happening and depreciation and amortisation of the cost of the renovations. On the positive side, we had a big improvement in trading once the renovations were completed. Our surplus for the year was \$42,938 compared to \$70,320 last year. However, if the new depreciation and amortisation of the renovations are excluded the surplus was \$62,800. Our financial position is strong with over \$300,000 cash in banks. Please refer to the Treasurer's report for more information on our financial results.

We were very pleased to receive a grant of \$15,000 thanks to Jonathan O'Dea Member for Davidson and NSW Government to install a new retractable awning along the western wall.

We were fortunate to gain 12 new members from Gordon Bowling Club and all have fitted in very well and are welcome and active members of our club. However, 33 bowling members did not renew their membership for 2018/19 because of poor health or other reasons. This is higher than previous years. Sadly, our bowling membership is aging and the trend will continue. However, our bowling membership is still good and allows us to

provide good social bowls, to participate in Pennants and to enter competitive teams in the various inter-club tournaments. Both women's and men's clubs had success in Pennants this year. The women's Grade 4 side retained the District Flag again this year but unfortunately lost in the State Finals. The men's Grade 7 side won the Zone flag - it has been 12 years for the men since they won a flag. As I write this report the Grade 7 side will be playing their State Finals next weekend and I hope they will be successful.

As I said above, we have enjoyed a dramatic increase in social membership since the renovations were completed. 480 new social members have joined since November with the vast majority joining for 3 years. As at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018 we had 917 social members. The new clubhouse has achieved our objective of creating a clubhouse that attracted a big increase in social members who frequent the club regularly.

The appearance of our clubhouse has changed and we have gained a significant increase in social membership however, we had not lost sight of the fact that bowling is why we exist and we must retain our friendly culture and our enjoyment of bowls. Our bowling membership and financials are our strengths however, we face the same challenges that all bowling clubs are facing – an aging and declining bowling membership and the difficulties in attracting new bowling members.

I want to thank the Board for all the help and support given to me during the year. Our Treasurer Tim Walton managed our finances very professionally and I want to especially thank Tim for his help during the renovations. Without his help I would have collapsed during those hectic months. Our Women's Club president is always enthusiastic and does a very good job leading the Women's Club. Di introduced Jack Attack during the year which was popular. Tony Lee did his usual great job managing our sponsors until his ill health prevented him from continuing. I thank very much Ray Gleeson for stepping up and taking on the Sponsorship role and he has done a good job. Jock Currie joined the Board and took on the Membership Director role. He did not expect processing the massive



number of new social members would absorb so much of his time. There were so many new members to be processed through our system and I greatly appreciate that Jenni Bradley helped Jock every Thursday. Mike Heath has been looking after our IT needs and has created our new website and Facebook page. I thank Ross Johnson for the support and guidance he provided regarding the restaurant, poker machines and general house matters.

Our Club survives because of volunteers and I thank the many members who participated on various committees and did things to help with the general running of our Club. However, it is becoming very difficult to get volunteers and I am very concerned about this. Without volunteers we would not be able to operate so I urge all members to do your part and help out in some way. At the risk of missing someone, I would like to thank Mike Doyland for regularly coming to the Club to check on things and taking care of matters that need doing, Gerry Hurdwell and his team for keeping our gardens looking so beautiful, Chris Hartmann and Richard Lander for preparing the Handbook, David Hagley for managing our website and Gerard Coggans for taking on the new website, Richard Hunt our historian who also manages the men's clothing store, the Wednesday morning crew, Tony Tinworth for his support of our Treasurer, Kuno for running raffles for the men's club and on carnival days until he handed this over to Ray Gleeson, the Women's Club for the card days and the fashion parades they organize and all the other volunteers.

I especially want to thank our Bar Manager Iain Howell for the fantastic job he does managing the bar and our bar staff. Iain does more than manage the bar and it was his idea to introduce live music with Sunday Live and he promotes and organizes barefoot bowls. He also provides support and helps organize when people use our venue for functions. Our friendly bar staff give good service and are appreciated by our members.

Our sponsors and the support they provide are very important to us. This support provides important funds we need for the general activities of the Club and to conduct our bowls carnivals and other bowls events

Our major sponsor Chadwick Real Estate has been with us for many years and we greatly appreciate their loyal support.

We thank our other sponsors ASNU Group of Trades, Pernod Ricard (Jacob's Creek Wines), Guardian Funerals, Helloworld St Ives Travel and Your Chemist Shop at St Ives Chase and all of the scoreboard sponsors.

The clubhouse renovation was a major milestone for our Club and the past year has been very busy. I hope the coming year is not as stressful but we will be busy with our bowling activities and improving our clubhouse services.

## **Treasurer's Report**

### **Year ended 30 June 2018**

The results for the year are encouraging given the fact that the first 5 months of the year involved work being undertaken on the renovations of the Club.

The surplus for the year was \$42,938, after all depreciation and amortisation. Note 19 shows how much the depreciation and amortisation rose for the year as a result of the renovations and new furniture. This depreciation was for 6 months or less, so this increase will double over the next 12 months. We have to write off the renovations over the remainder of the lease term and the furniture and fittings are depreciated at 10% per annum on cost. So surpluses in the next few years will be impacted because of this additional "on paper cost".

Generation of cash reserves, rather than paper surpluses, is what is most important for a club such as ours. We do not seek to generate reserves to pay out distributions to members- this is prohibited at law. What we do need to do is to build cash reserves so that we can have a secure position in the case of poor years in the future and can make future improvements for the club, whatever form that may take.

Our cash position, having completed and paid for the renovations is very healthy. For those interested in what was spent during the year on the renovations and furniture, look at the Statement of Cash Flows and note the amount spent on Plant and Equipment of \$557,481. This was inside our budget. We still have cash in the bank of over \$300,000, and debtors just about cover creditors. Of that cash, some relates to payments in advance, being 2018/19 subscriptions (\$36,099) and sponsors funds unreleased of \$50,200. See Note 4. These funds will be released to trading over the year, but it is still cash in the bank for the club. So a healthy balance sheet as far as a club such as our is concerned- even after the renovations.

With respect to trading for the 2017/18 year, encouraging results worth noting were returned for Bar Trading (up 50% on the prior year- see Note 7 ) and Bowls Trading (see note 9). The influx of active bowlers from Gordon Bowling Club has certainly helped with regard to Bowls Trading.

Not so encouraging are the results for Poker Machine Trading (see Note 8). The main factor here is the fact that clearances from the Poker Machines (i.e.plays on the machines) are significantly down and have remained so since the renovations. We can no longer afford to rely on significant contributions each year from Poker Machine trading and all small venues are experiencing this trend. Tournament revenues are also down and this is a trend that also looks like continuing into the future for all clubs. In addition some general costs are increasing due to the club being used by more people (see Note 15 for such costs).

This Club only survives because of volunteers. Without them, green fees, subscriptions and bar prices would have to rise to cover wages or we would fail. For my part, I need to thank all the people who volunteered to assist me with the financials for the Club during the year. Those who get up early in the morning one day a week to help with the overall weekly reconciliation- your help is very much appreciated. Also our stock counters. Particular thanks from me go to those that have helped with the accounting. Ray Gleeson for his help on the weekly reconciliation from time to time, Jennie Bradley for wages and also for help with some training, Keith Walker for volunteering to take on the wages each week going forward, and specifically Tony Tinworth for the payments work that he does. Tony has been doing this job for many years and this has been an enormous help to me in my 4 years as Treasurer. He has indicated that this will be his last year doing this work and Adrian Needham has kindly volunteered to do the job going forward once trained up. Thank you all, plus anyone that I have missed out mentioning.

On a final note, I want to specifically make mention of two people that put an enormous amount of time into the running of our club. I don't think members realise the amount of time that both Kevin Latham and Iain Howell donate to the Club for the "essential services" that they provide- particularly at this time as our club changes how it operates to serve our community following the renovations and the influx of new social members. Without them both, this club would be in a very stretched financial position because we would have to pay someone to do the work they do to keep the Club open and serving our members. Members should also note that the fact we came in just under Budget on the renovations is all down to the meticulous project management undertaken by Kevin and he deserves considerable thanks from all of us for this alone.

We were boosted and very pleased that 12 joined us from Gordon Bowling Club at the end of last year. This helped us maintain our bowling numbers as at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018 at around the same level as 2017.

However, age and ill health is catching up with many bowling members and this has resulted in many not renewing their bowling membership for 2108/19. 33 or 15% did not renew and this much higher than prior years. This is a real worrying trend.

We have had a huge growth in social membership since the renovations were completed and the new clubhouse opened at the end of November. The numbers above show that Social Membership grew by 297 but this does not take account of the social members who did not renew when their membership expired during the year. Since our renovations were completed we have had 480 new social members join to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018.

I especially thank Jenni Bradley for all the help she provided entering the new members into our membership system.

### **Report on the Financial Report**
